THE BENEFITS OF HOMESCHOOLING A DYSLEXIC CHILD

As a parent of a child with dyslexia, it is gut wrenching to have to watch your child struggle as they attempt to keep up with all of the demands of school. The fight for services, accommodations, and/or modifications is frustrating, continually disappointing, and emotionally exhausting for parents. Even when we are lucky enough to "win" our battles at CSE, that usually doesn't occur until years later, after our children are functioning significantly below their peers. Since dyslexia often coexists with other learning disabilities, it is not uncommon for our children to receive numerous "pull outs" each day. While these "pull outs" are essential, they take our kids out of the enjoyable elective classes where many dyslexic children excel.

If this resonates with you and you are looking for a change, then you may want to consider homeschooling and the freedom that comes along with overseeing your child's education. At home, you are the one individualizing your child's educational needs. You can provide any accommodation needed. If your child requires extra time for an assignment/test, a graphic organizer, a break, a quiet space to work, directions repeated, a fidget or a snack to help with focus, the option to stand while learning or walk around the room freely when needed, then you can provide it.

While there are regulations that are mandated by NYS, you can cater to the interests of your child. Homeschooling does not have to be a replica of the traditional school setting, nor should it be. You can sit outside on a nice day for your lessons. You can learn fractions in the kitchen while you are baking, learn about percents, whole numbers, decimals, and money while you are out shopping, or you can have a science lesson about the ocean as you are on the beach. You can take your child on field trips to museums, libraries, plays and concerts. You can incorporate educational games into your lessons.

There are tons of options when it comes to curriculum, and you can find reviews which list the pros and cons of each curriculum so that you can make an educated decision on what will work best for your family. You can hire someone else to do the teaching (if children from other families are not present), but the parent is responsible for filing the necessary paperwork required by the NYS homeschool regulations, such as the IHIP (Individualized Home Instruction Plan) and the quarterly reports. You can enroll your child/children in co-ops or learning centers as long as at least half of the schooling is completed by a parent or the hired tutor.

If your child has an IEP, as a homeschooler, you can transfer your child's IEP to an IESP if you still want them to receive services such as OT, PT, speech or even resource room through the district. To guarantee services for the upcoming year, you will have to notify the district of your intent to homeschool by June 1st. Also, there are many Facebook groups that are dedicated to homeschooling dyslexic students, where many questions can be answered by veteran homeschoolers.
