
MULTISENSORY LEARNING ON MY ORTON-GILLINGHAM JOURNEY

As we recently welcomed a new year, I have had the chance to reflect on events that have impacted my life in meaningful ways. The truth is that you never know how one event will influence your life. One such event in my life was when I walked into a volunteer orientation at Literacy Nassau a few summers ago. I was looking for a way to volunteer in my community. I read about Literacy Nassau's work with



reading. As a teacher, it seemed like a perfect fit. Little did I know, attending that orientation would launch my Orton-Gillingham journey; a journey that I am happy to still be on today. It is a journey that has increased my understanding of dyslexia as well as the value of multisensory instruction.



Multisensory instruction allows children to learn by utilizing more than one sense at a time. It therefore incorporates not just visual and auditory senses, but kinesthetic/tactile senses as well. Learning about and utilizing multisensory strategies has perhaps been one of the most beneficial parts of my OG journey, and so I would like to share some of my favorites.

Let's start with finger tapping and SOS. Finger tapping lets children tap out each phoneme or sound with their fingers. It

can be used for blending sounds in reading and segmenting in spelling. SOS (Simultaneous Oral Spelling) involves saying, tapping, spelling, and writing words while naming each letter. It lets children see and hear the words as they write them. These strategies have been helpful in both my in-person lessons and my virtual lessons. My on-line students are able to use these strategies as they spell words in real time by writing directly on their screens, which they love to do!



Some of my other favorite multisensory activities include writing in sand, forming letters out of playdough or clay, and spelling words with Legos. The kinesthetic practice involved in these are great for building

connections in the brain. They are hands-on and very engaging. I also love using dot paint to read words, incorporating word crafts, and using water colors to reveal and read words. Crafts and water colors work great not only for decodable words, but sight words too. Trace, Copy, Cover is another favorite for sight



Helping my students learn is important to me, and so I love that I am able to use multisensory strategies to help them become stronger, more confident readers. The multisensory strategies that I have learned and continue to learn on my OG journey with Literacy Nassau have made me a better teacher!
