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WHEN LITERARY DREAMS COME TRUE

This month marks a moment I've been dreaming of since I was a child. As of May 16th, I am officially a published author.

My love of literacy and language runs so deep that for as long as I can remember, I have enjoyed "playing" with words. When I was in kindergarten, my mom enrolled me in a Saturday enrichment program at Queens College for Creative Writing, where I began learning about poetry and fun stuff, like alliteration. (Somewhere in my house, there's a poem I wrote about a chubby chocolatecolored chipmunk named Charlie.) As an only child growing up in the 80's and 90's, it was easy to turn to books for entertainment, and I spent countless hours at the library piling on books to take home and read.

In junior high school, I used to delight my father by writing song parodies. To this day, I still do this, often with my girls. In 2016, when my daughters were 4 and 3, I wrote one for my husband for Valentine's Day about how sick we always were because little kids are just a bundle of incessant germs. Rules are a funny thing. My girls are at the ages now where they love to test boundaries to see what they can get away with. Rules exist everywhere, I tell them, for lots of reasons and for a variety of different purposes.

Literacy Nassau is no exception. As our program year begins to wind down, I'd like to take a moment to remind everyone about the protocol and rules we are expected to follow regarding student data. The state gets our funding from the federal government, and without good data from us, the state won't get that money. Our ALE grant is what keeps our program free, so it's essential that our data tells the story of all the great things we do! COMMUNITY OUTREACH

We have been getting invitations to share information about Literacy Nassau's programs at different community events. On March 25, I presented at the North Babylon ENL info session. They have a Saturday Academy for students (adults and children) and invited several organizations to visit and explain their services. I was able to tell everyone about both our ENL services for adults and children and our work with children with dyslexia. Several families were interested in our citizenship classes and took home flyers. In addition to meeting students, I had the opportunity to visit with other organizations in attendance. I



met representatives from the Empire Justice Center, which works with families in need of housing or immigration services; Latina Moms connect, which offers cultural resources and networking; representatives who could assist with SNAP benefits; and the LI Regional Partnership Center, which assists in understanding special education and the IEP process. It was a great day to meet potential students and to obtain information that may be of use for our current students.



On April 15, I had the pleasure of participating in Wantagh Library's Community Resource Fair. It was a great opportunity to network with people in the local community and to meet potential volunteers. I was able to talk about our services, volunteer needs, and offer information on signing up for a volunteer orientation. I shared about our adult and children's services, encouraged participation in our Orton-Gillingham Summer Program which we are enrolling for now, and explained how we offer services for adult ELL and Basic Literacy students in libraries throughout Nassau County.

I was also able to network with several other organizations including: Book Fairies, the Long Island Volunteer Center, Eager to Serve, NY Marine Rescue Center, South Shore Guidance Center, EPIC, New York Blood Center, LI Center for Independent Living, CN Guidance and Counseling, Big Brothers Big Sisters, the Community Development Corporation of Long Island, and the United Way. It was a wonderful opportunity to meet people right in our own neighborhood. I hope that it will bring us some new volunteers for our programs, some potential students, and will also help us to increase the number of community referrals we can make for our case management work with our adult English Language Learner population.



Adrienne has been tutoring with us for many years and her students are always appreciative of her time and efforts towards teaching.


