

Spring is a time for growth and change, and this spring, especially, we're feeling it here at Literacy Nassau. Many changes are afoot, starting with our Board leadership.

To be fair, the Board of Directors that saw our organization through COVID-19 are some of the most dedicated, generous supporters Literacy Nassau has ever seen. Many of them were kind enough to stay on and serve for way longer than they expected, as we were unable to recruit in 2020 and 2021. In fact, we didn't really begin recruiting again until about 2023, and now the composition of the Board is so rich that they finally felt comfortable stepping down.

Iris Grover was one of the first people I ever met when I joined LN as the Executive Director 15 years ago. The first thing I

decided to do was take a Tutor Training Workshop. Back then, these workshops were 18 hours long, held in 3-hour increments in libraries around Nassau. I took mine at the Lynbrook



Library and was so impressed that the people delivering the workshops were volunteers with the organization. Iris, a retired reading teacher, was engaging, knowledgeable, and supportive of the fact that I was in a leadership role but had literally everything to learn. When I learned she was also up for a position on our Board of Directors, I was thrilled.

Iris began her first Board term in May, 2010, and stayed on for 6 years, as per the by-laws. She served in the Executive Cabinet as Board Secretary and supported the organization in many ways. Her family and friends would come to our (un)Scrabble gala every year. She'd conduct In-Service Trainings and other tutor engagement events. She donated funds to help us build our new center. She was lovely to be around, and we often had lunch together at Rachel's, a restaurant in Freeport, to catch up on work and family stuff.

Iris took a year off in 2016 and rejoined the Board after the hiatus year, eager to return and continue helping us grow our programs and mission. She remained steadfast in her willingness to lend a hand in any endeavor necessary, and at the end of 2024, she resigned. She will be dearly missed, but will always remain a friend to our organization.

Trish began teaching an ESL class in January and was quick to build a community of learners who support one another. Trish has also volunteered as a Next Chapter Book Club facilitator and will soon begin sharing her love of reading with a small group of adults with developmental disabilities as well.

I've held many positions in my life. I've been a Wall Street executive, a stay at home mom, a teacher and a civil servant. Besides staying home with my children for a number of years, teaching is for sure my passion. Working with adults is particularly rewarding because I can empathize with each adult student's desire to improve themselves and assimilate. 

As a non-profit that works to help adults reach education and employment goals, whose target population often bears the brunt of scams and labor exploitation, Irv was a great addition to our team. When we got our Office for New Americans grant, Irv presented to our classes about labor rights. He served as our chief (un)Scrabble judge for many years, and was a committed part of our Board of Directors, orchestrating the revitalization of our Advisory Board, lending support to Recognition Night and other events, and even delivering a keynote address to our tutors at our 2016 Tutor Conference.

Just like Iris, Irv took a brief hiatus after his 6-year term ended, and when he returned in 2018, we were about to open a brand new facility. Sadly, Irv's son David passed away in November of 2016. Irv stayed with us long past his own retirement from the labor department in 2019 in an effort to continue to generate interest in and support for Literacy Nassau. 
DANIELA GALLINA
