## OG IN THE MEDIA: MY FAVORITE PODCASTS

There is nothing I love more than reading but as a busy wife, mother, and OG tutor, I don't always have the time to cuddle up with a good book. In the past few years, I have started listening to many audiobooks and podcasts so I can keep informed while still being active. In the past two years, as awareness and interest in the science of reading has been on the rise, the number of podcasts concerned with this topic have risen, too. Below are some of the podcasts that have been consistently on my playlists. I hope you enjoy them as much as I do!

•Sold a Story Podcast- Emily Hanford first made headlines with her 2018 podcast entitled "Hard Words: Why Aren't Kids Being Taught to Read?" That podcast revealed to the masses what many in education had already known: current practices in reading education weren't working. Millions of kids were being set up for failure because schools were not using evidence-based practices to teach reading. Last year, Hanford released a 6-episode podcast as a follow-up to Hard Words entitled Sold A Story. Sold a Story exposed the origins of the whole language/balanced literacy approach to instruction rooted in the Reading Recovery program. This program was developed in the 1960s and promoted a three-cueing approach to

reading instruction over phonics. Sold A Story highlights how these ineffective methods turned into big business as publishing companies, such as Heinemann, sold boxed guided reading and writing programs to school districts around the country. Two of the most popular programs, *Fountas and Pinnell Literacy* and *Units of Study* (by the Teachers' College Reading and Writing Project), have made millions of dollars for their publisher and authors. Teachers and



Administrators all over the country were, literally, "sold a story" on how to teach reading, and millions of school children paid the price.

•The Literacy View: Real Teachers Letting Loose- Co-hosts Faith Borkowsky and Judy Boksner truly live up to the subtitle in their podcast title: they ARE real teachers and, boy, do they let loose! Faith and Judy have had a "trial by fire" as classroom teachers in New York, and they have been tutors, literacy coaches, and professional development gurus. On the podcast, they tackle every topic in the "science of reading" with honesty, expertise, and humor! Their guests run the gamut--they have interviewed world-renowned literacy experts like Tim Rasinski, parents fighting for their children with grass-roots advocacy, and everyone in between. The Literacy View is an entertaining, informative, "no-holds-barred" commentary on the state of literacy instruction today.
