

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BECOMING A FELLOW: KAREN'S JOURNEY

For 7 years, I've been studying the OG approach and climbing a certification ladder towards becoming an Academy Fellow. I'm entering my final year of study this year, which means everything I do is essentially part of a huge, cumulative final exam.

While my daughter was in horse camp, I spent my summer in the basement of a Cape Cod library, writing a curriculum for a 5-day, 30-hour training. The training is the first half of a 60-hour, year-long Associate course that we run every year, which I am solely responsible for this year. What I write will become Literacy Nassau's course guide to becoming an Associate-level OG practitioner - a course which can - in the future - be delivered to teachers in school districts.

In 2016, when I met with John and Janet Kornreich about my idea to introduce tutoring services for children with dyslexia, I knew the road to creating a sustainable model would be long. This is why they made an 8-year investment in our organization. 7 years in, I can say with great pride that what we are building will change the education landscape for Long Island kids in a tremendous way for many years to come. There is dyslexia legislation being developed as I write this that will one day make it's way to school administrations all over NY in the form of mandates

from the NYS Education Department. One day, schools will have to provide proper, science-of-reading-based interventions to children with dyslexia, and the first step will be to train their teachers.

And when that happens, Literacy Nassau will be ready to help.

It's amazing how much I've learned, and continue to learn, on this journey. This is the first time writing a whole curriculum, and it fascinates me. It took me six weeks to develop five days of workshops, through which I am teaching our new OG cohort of trainees everything you could ever dream of knowing about the English language. It's intense and scary, but I love it. And this is only the beginning! This year, I'll be observing them as they teach, I'll be helping guide them toward their own applications, and I'll be creating and delivering professional development workshops for them to help them grow as they move through the school year. When they apply (and pass, thus becoming Associate level OG therapists), it will be because of me.

Imagine that - but for any school district on LI. Imagine the number of kids those lives will change as a result of this work. It's staggering, and I am so proud to be at the helm of this monumental moment.

She eagerly cleaned horse stalls, groomed the horses and ponies, and learned some higher level riding skills. It brought her so much joy, which as a mom made me overwhelmingly happy.

Students with learning differences need to have experiences of success to remind them that we all have our strengths. Now, this year, we're planning weekly horse lessons for Julie so she can consistently be reminded of how it feels to be good at something. Remember that when you work with your student! Happy fall!

OG SUMMER INTENSIVE PROGRAM REFLECTIONS

We just completed the third year of our OG Summer Intensive Program. It was such a pleasure to work with both new and returning students. Our program is tailored to each student's ability level and needs. Even though students meet in small groups during the summer, work is differentiated to meet each student's needs.

Mary and Rich's group focused on closed syllables, open syllables, digraphs, welds, and magic e syllables. Students improved in their ability to recognize vowel sounds and to blend words. I shared a group with Izzy. Our group focused on magic e, bossy r, and vowel team syllables, syllable division, and soft c and g. Students improved in their ability to read multisyllabic words and to read with fluency.

At the end of each session, each student completed a short assessment which covered all the skills taught during that session so parents could see their progress and we can continue to individualize instruction for students who will continue with us in the fall. 

Tutor Reflections


