

## THE GRATIFYING EXPERIENCE OF MY PRESIDENCY

It was both an honor and a privilege to serve as the President of the Board of Directors of Literacy Nassau from June

2019 through June 2022 and it's hard to express how proud I am of our achievements during that time. We managed to stay open and relevant during a time when



many small non-profits shut their doors. We were also able to innovate and thrive! Thanks to the awesome efforts of Karen Micciche and staff, as well as the commitments of tutors and students, we have so many accomplishments to crow about.

Perhaps the most lasting shift is that our physical space grew by about 50% during the pandemic. We built an outdoor pavilion to accommodate tutors and students in the open air quarters of part of the parking lot so that our tutoring services could continue safely in a face-to-face environment. That was so successful that we built a second, larger pavilion for small group use up on the hill adjacent to our building. We

recently upgraded all of the outdoor spaces to include electricity, fans, permanent heaters, and vinyl windows, so that the structures can be used throughout all four seasons. We also utilized the Zoom platform for our adult basic learners and English as a Second Language classes. We are currently slowly switching back to a live

Prior to the pandemic, we started using Orton-Gillingham methodology to teach dyslexic children to read and write; this is a multisensory, structured, sequential approach to literacy. In 2019, we had a contract with one school district and now we are serving seven different school districts, thus increasing the chances for so many more students with learning disabilities to get the assistance they need from properly trained therapists. Last summer, we launched our OG Summer Intensive Program for children, enabling them to continue to learn and grow their skills and avoid the "summer slide." Similarly, this past winter, we developed and piloted our Saturday English Immersion program for ESOL children, to




#### SATURDAY ENL IMMERSION PROGRAM

#### RESOURCE CORNER: INCREASING RIGOR IN THE ESL CLASSROOM

Every year, we are required to attend 14 hours of professional development workshops approved by NYS Ed. As I was reviewing the list of offerings and trying to squeeze something into my already tight schedule, I was surprised when I recognized the name of one of the presenters: Sara Izquierdo! For those of you who are new to Literacy Nassau, Sara was a Literacy Specialist and ESL teacher of ours for several years. I know that she's a great teacher so I made sure that I signed up for one of her workshops.

Sara's workshop focused on increasing the rigor in our classrooms and gave a lot of great examples of how to do just this. Increasing rigor means creating challenges for our ELL students to get more practice with academic language, learning strategies, and critical thinking. The audience was engaged in several activities that they could repeat with their students. Participants got to share ideas and collaborate with other teachers from many different adult education programs across Long Island.

We talked about having students read passages and respond to literal reading comprehension questions first to ensure that they understand the basics. Then, rigor can be increased by asking deeper questions, having students make inferences, draw conclusions about the text, sequence or categorize information in new ways, and share their opinions or how the information applies to their lives.

Sara also introduced us to some resources from lincs.ed.gov that I think would be very useful for our classes. I hope you all have a chance to take a look at these resources and try them out with your students. One sample activity that I really enjoyed was watching a short clip of a Coca-Cola UK: Grandpa: Living a Healthy Lifestyle on YouTube then asking students to discuss what changed from the before/after portions of the video, discuss vocabulary, give their opinions on who was living a healthier lifestyle and why, discuss who created the commercial and why, what their real goals are, how they want us to feel after watching, and how successful advertising is and why. Students can also be reminded to always look for the sources of the information they receive. They can assess the credibility of the source and determine if they can trust the information.

I enjoyed the interactive workshop and the chance to break up into groups and brainstorm ideas. I also enjoyed having the chance to catch up with a former colleague. I am so glad to know that Sara is doing well and that she has continued to help adults on Long Island learn English. She was glad to hear updates from Literacy Nassau and wishes everyone well.

Mara Jacobowitz has been tutoring with us for several years. We are always impressed by her dedication to her students and her ability to differentiate instruction to each student's unique needs. She is one of our Basic Literacy tutors who has worked with adult learners with low reading/writing skills. I am always happy to hear updates on her students and to see all the progress they have made in their reading and writing and the impact it has made in their lives, allowing them to be more independent and to rely on family/friends less to read to them.

Mara has been tutoring Maria Brathwaite for the past few years and has this to say about her experience: "Several years ago I was blessed with being paired with a wonderful learner. Having failed with a number of volunteers, I had to convince my student that she and I would fulfill her dream and passion of learning to read. Taking a moment to read what she wrote about our experience, I am humbled. I hope all volunteers and students reading what she wrote will be inspired."

Maria had limited letter/sound knowledge and struggled with forming letters appropriately. She submitted the following reflection, "When you are upset you need to pray and God will answer your prayer and you will be happy. I know that when I couldn't read I ask God to help me to read. I had a lot of people who did not help me to read so I prayer and ask God read now I have the right teacher to read."

We thank Mara for her continued work with Literacy Nassau students and we congratulate Maria on her great strides in literacy.


