

### THE FUTURE OF ALE

As you may know, this spring marks the end of the fifth and final year of our current state Adult Literacy Education grant. This grant is managed by the New York State Education Department and makes our adult ESOL programming possible. We are in the process of applying for more funding for the future, but there will likely be some changes. Right now, everything is up in the air because the grant announcements will not take place until the very end of June, or perhaps even early July.

However, there are some things we can share:

- 1) Our intention is to continue serving our lowest-level adult ESOL learners in a very similar fashion to what we're all used to.
  2) Should we receive funding, we will be required to continue hosting our literacy programming live in libraries, and given the current political climate, some of our students might not feel safe. So it is also our intention to create an online course for people who feel more comfortable learning English from home.
- 3) There was some language in the new grant process that will shift the roles our volunteers will be able to play moving forward. Literacy Nassau is committed to utilizing volunteers across our programs and because we have many different

funding sources, we plan to focus on new opportunities for our volunteer corps moving forward. There will be lots more information to share about this in the coming months, so stay tuned!

As ever, we are committed to our adult population and to making sure they have access to the very best programming possible. We look forward to seeing what the future brings for Literacy Nassau!

Wishing you and your family a very happy spring!




